Aparicio, Schulman elected to MCND#1

Matagorda Co.ballots beavily favored Republicans, 3-1

Matagorda Co. retained its bright shade of red, so say the results of last week's General Election.

Less than half of the County's 21,681 eligible registered voters took to the polls in this year's election, with just 9,713 ballots being processed, 44.8% of the eligible electorate.

In the local races, where party doesn't really matter as much, voters in Matagorda Co. Navigation District #1 approved another term in Commissioner Pos. 1 for David Aparicio and newcomer Alan

Schulman was voted in to fill the vacancy in Pos. 5.

Aparicio held on to his seat against the challenge of Rusty Feather, with a 977-346 vote margin.

In the race to replace outgoing Commissioner Donny Tran in Pos. 5, Schulman toppled James Georgi via 70 percent of the vote, an 879-373 margin.

An odd note in the MCND#1 races - the two races had differing numbers of votes cast. The Pos. 1 race had 1,323 ballots cast, while the race for Pos. 5 drew 1,252 total votes.

In the races for Tidehaven ISD Trustee, a total of 3,843 ballots were cast,

spread over the nine candidates.

When the dust settled Cody

When the dust settled, Cody Frick, Mike Galvan, Jr., Stephen 'T-John' Crow and Eric Kacer were the top vote getters.


State Races

Matgorda Co. followed the lead for much of the Lone Star State with a strong Republican lean.

In the race for Governor of Texas, incumbent Republican Greg Abbott carried the County with over 75% of the vote. Democratic challenger Beto O'Rourke garnered 2,259 votes across

Rainbowland announces plans for expansion

Rainbowland Daycare, located at 905 6th St., is the only licensed childcare center withing a 30 mile radius and Administrator Melinda Cruz and the Board of Directors have been working on plans for expanding the daycare since fall of 2021.

"Our current waitlist has 36 children on it and it's disheartening as the director to have to tell parents that the wait to get their child into our center could be a year to 2 years depending on the child's age."

According to Cruz, the daycare receives 5-10 telephone calls each week regarding parents need for childcare and inquiries for children to be placed on the daycare's waitlist. Cruz advises parents, prior to the birth of their children, to place their children on the wait list due to the length of the list

Fortunately, the daycare facility has plans for expansion to allow for care of an additional 30-35 children and is currently in the engineering stage of the project.

"The expansion will be towards Perryman and our playgrounds will be moved to different areas on our property to accommodate this. The expansion will consist of an additional building about the size of the current

one and a covered breeze-way connecting the current building to the new building. The new building will house two new Nursery classrooms, two new two-year-old classrooms, and the new large 3 & 4 year old

classroom."

Plans also include renovations of the current building to house an additional one-year old classroom, creating administration offices, and restructuring a more secure front entrance requiring a triple entry in order to gain

"Once the engineering phase of this project is complete we will then open the project to bids. In order to apply for grants that focus on education and childcare we have to have plans and bids," stated Cruz.

access to the children.

Rainbowland Daycare is a non-profit childcare center, therefore, the facility relies on grants and fundraisers to complete this expansion.

Cruz hopes to break ground on this much anticipated expansion next year, however, this timeframe is dependent upon grants and fundraising efforts.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank our community for their continued support in our fundraising efforts, without them none of this would be possible. We look forward to

the County. Libertarian candidate Mark Tigppetts received 68 votes and the Green Party's Delilah Barrios netted 29.

Incumbent Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick, Republican, won 74% of the Matagorda Co. 9,633 votes cast, followed Democratic challenger Mike Collier 2,273 votes, and 200 cast for Liberterian candidate Shanna

Steele.

An standing felony indictment didn't prevent incumbent Republican Attorney General Ken Paxton from taking home over 74% of the Countywide ballots. Challengers Rochelle Garza (Dem) and Mark Ash (Lib) netted 2,230 and 239 votes, respectively.

Incumbent State Comptroller, Glenn Hegar carried

the Count with 76% of the vote, over challengers Democrat Janet T. Duddings and Liberterian Alonzo Echevarria-Garca.

The General Land Office Commissioner race was led locally by Republican Dawn Buckingham, who captured 7,283 of the 9,565 ballots cast. Democrat candidate Jay Kleberg finished with 22.72% of the vote.

Incumbent Ag Commissioner (Rep) Sid Miller took a 3-1 advantage in the county vote over Democrat challenger Susan Hayes.

In the race for Railroad Commissioner, Matagorda Co. voters favored Republican Wayne Christian with over 75% of the vote. Democratic candidate Luke Warford finished with 2,065 votes, 21.64%.

U.S. Rep

In the newly redstricted U.S. House District 22, incumbent Troy Nehls (Rep.) captured 76% of the 9,575 ballots cast. Democratic candidate Jamie Kaye Jordan finished with 22.23% of the



What will you stand up for????

Dear Editor,

Thank you for your coverage of the proposed demolition of The Luther Hotel, for bringing attention to the matter by making it worthy of front page news, and for placing it above the fold. Palacios would be just another small, unremarkable

rural Texas town, devoid of the outward manifestations of its history and relics, if we do not stand up for, and save, all the wonderful, historic places and structures that are so much a part of our rich heritage and history here. While the demolition of historic structures is all too familiar, the continued resistance to recognizing the value that historic buildings have to our community is disappointing. That doesn't have to be the case.

Our shared social and cultural history continues to be important in our daily lives; in fact, The Luther Hotel (and indeed all of our historic buildings) is in our collective, community DNA and the fabric that has woven this community together for nearly 120 years. It is my sincere hope that our citizens, City Council, and City Officials will view preservation as a tool that improves the quality of life in our community as it is not just our beloved Luther Hotel that is on the chopping block, but many of our historic buildings. We need to ensure that qualified individuals with a background in historic architecture and preservation

are able to assess the true state of The Luther Hotel and indeed the rest of our historic buildings. We also need to look more carefully at adaptive reuse of historic buildings and acknowledge the wide range of benefits of reuse versus demolition, including: retention of quality building materials, historic and architectural character, continuity with the existing streetscape and historic connection to our neighborhoods, sustainability, and incentives for rehabilitation. There are a multitude of benefits of joining the Main Street program and instituting a historic district

in Palacios including tax credits and money towards restoration projects (and no, the taxpayers don't pay for those grants - what they would pay for, though, is new infrastructure costs that would have to go into new construction). A historic district in Palacios will not only preserve our culture and small town feel that people have come to love, but provide a reason for people to visit us along the \$8 billion travel route that goes through the Texas Independence Trail of which we are along. The crown jewel, however, is The Luther Hotel, and a new heritage tourism initiative that encompasses a historic district would suffer tremendously without it. To the citizens reading this, if you don't stand up for The Luther Hotel, what WILL you stand up for? If we

don't take the time to recognize our history today, tomorrow it may very well be lost - and indeed we find it on the chopping block this very day. And we will never get it back if it is demolished. This is not just a sale between two private entities -The Luther Hotel is the most visibly public structure

in this entire city and has true historic value to not just our city and Texas, but to the nation. All options need to be considered by all parties before a final decision is made and a permit requested for demolition. And Evan Thompson, Executive Director of Preservation Texas, has pledged his support and has said he will be happy to attend a meeting with the Ed Rachal Foundation, the City, and our newly established Palacios Preservation Committee.
