## Lack of state funding puts 'bridge-the-gap' program at risk in PISD

According to the Texas Education Agency (TEA) 78.83% of Palacios ISD students are considered economically disadvantaged and Communities in Schools (CIS) tackles socioeconomic barriers helping nearly 200 students each month

CIS collaborates with parents, educators, community-based organizations, churches, and school and district leaders to identify and overcome obstacles for students to succeed in both school and life.

Dr. Bill Chapman described this existing program (which is in its' last funded semester) as "phenomenal" and "bridging a gap" and providing needs for the students outside the

realm that can be provided by the district at last week's Palacios ISD School Board Meeting. Chapman emphasized despite having already decreased next year's budget by over \$400,000 an additional \$500,000 will need to be cut due to lack of state funding. This lifeenhancing program will require \$100,000 to maintain being funded at PISD. However, only \$50,000 by PISD and the other \$50,000 will be matched by CIS, therefore, Chapman emphasized the school board members need to understand how instrumental this program is for PISD students.

CIS staff member, Samantha Starrett, was present to provide a confidential overview sharing some experiences of her 80 plus monthly student caseload to the board. Cur-

rently, Starrett is at the junior high and high school provide students with "behavioral and mental health, parent and family engagement, health and human services, attendance engagement, academic enhancement support and enrichment."

Specifically, CIS helps with food-insecure students with necessary food staples for weekends, provides assistance navigating local mental health resources and eligibility, as well as tangible needs (such as clothing, shoes, prom dresses), educational support with onsite tutoring, attendance accountability to the extent of making home visits, and empathetically and lovingly showing compassion providing emotional support to children lacking this at home.

"Majority of the students I work with don't have the home support to get them (the students) here." Starrett, stated "sometimes it's not an academic or behavioral issue," but stressed how it's nice for the students to know that they are cared about and that adults want them to succeed in school for their own wellbeing.

Weekly, Starrett also provides emotional support games with the lifeskill students to identify emotions and learn ways to be more expressive and navigate emotions. Starrett's colleague Gina Guerrero was not available for the board meeting, however, has a separate caseload of 94 students at East Side and Central Elementary which involves much parental involvement and also provides the fam(See PISD, Page 3)
