Cink ousts Gardner for Mayor of Palacios

When all the votes were tallied, a new Mayor of Palacios., two former Council members set to return to the table - one via a 7 vote margin, and the incumbent school board trustees were re-elected in last week's joint election.

In the race for Mayor of Palacios, Rick Cink turned incumbent Jim Gardner into a one-term pony with 67.58% of the 512 ballots cast. Cink picked up 220 of his 346 votes during early voting, while Gardner netted 98. On Election Day last Saturday, 118 of the 183 that passed thru the polls voted for Cink. Gardner picked up 3 of the 11 absentee votes.

Lewis & Samora back to Council; Botbyl & Filip re-elected to PISD

In a race decided by seven votes, less than half-a-percent of the 487 ballots cast, Ravlynn Samora edged Pos. 1 Councilman Larry Glenn, 247-240. Glenn edged Samora in the early vote, 163-145, however the former one-term Councilwoman netted 96 of the 168 votes on Election Day. Glenn was selected on five of the 11 absentee ballots.

The Council Pos. 2 race between a pair of former Councilmembers, the voters chose Troy Lewis on 63.69% of the 482 ballots over Michael Dotson. Lewis doubled-up Dotson in early voting, 202-103, and picked up another

three of 10 absentee ballots.

Unopposed in her bid for reelection to Pos. 6 but still on the ballot, incumbent Donna Schulman garnered 409 votes.

Palacios ISD

Incumbents ruled the ballot box for the PISD Trustee races, with a large majority of ballots being cast during early voting.

Carl Filip held on to his seat at Pos. 1 with 402 of 646 votes over challenger Ron Laws. Filip picked up 245 votes during early voting, while Laws registered 151. On Election Day,

98 votes on Election Day. Dotson picked up Laws was chosen on 37.5% of the 224 total ballots cast. Filip garnered eight of 17 ballots cast via absentee voting.

> In the three-headed race for Pos. 2, incumbent and current Board President, Karen Botbyl retained her seat with 270 of 647 tickets. over a pair of former Trustees in Fabian Marroquin and Greg Hunter.

Marroquin tallied 138 of his 207 ballots during Early Voting, and Hunter finished with a total of 170 votes overall.

boo-boo in the Pearl of Palacios Planned Unit Development (PUD) Ordinance approved by the Palacios City Council at its April 25 meeting. While the planned, discussed and ultimately ap-

proved scope of the 36-acre PUD followed the South Bay waterfront from 5th St. westward to 9th St., the GPS coordinates didn't match. Instead, the coordinates in the ordinance language extended east from 5th St. to the Texas Baptist Encampment, then picked up on East Bay Blvd. and extended northward to encompass the entire East
