The Palacios Lions Club light the summer night sky ablaze in color with fireworks for the 75th annual 4th of July celebration. A trio of Palacians were fortunate for the quick action of Palacios Police Officers who awoke the three sleeping individuals and helped them to escape an early morning blaze in the 800 block of Rorem. A Texas Historical Marker dedica-

tion for the Pierce brothers was held at Hawley Cemetery. New bayfrolnt shelter began to take shape with the laying of foundations. The Palacios Police Dept. graduated its 2nd class of participants in the PPD Citizen's Academy Program. The Deutschburg Community Club was recipient of a \$50,000 grant from the Lavaca Navidad River Authority Community Partnership Program. Mayor Rick Cink passed out Keys to the City to the Palacios Little League All-Star team coaches Trent Weixelman - minor baseball, Hank Serna - minor softball, and Brittany Garcia - major softball. Tidehaven's Thrilla from the Killa 7-on-7 team came up short in the Div. II title game against Gunter. Palacios took a direct blow from category one Hurricane Beryl. Palacios ISD Trustee in Pos.

7 Marcos Aparicio announced his resignation and Terri Adams was appointed to fulfill his remaining term. The Palacios Economic Development Corp. welcomed new directors Selina Garcia and Donny Tran to the board of directors. Dave Campbell's Football Magazine forecast for the football season had the Sharks on the outside looking in at the playoffs. Palacios was still recovering from Hurricane Beryl, which left residents without power after toppled trees damaged power lines. The Salvation Army's Mobile Kitchen set up shot offering free meals to citizens still struggling without power. The Tidehaven Tigers were ranked no. 10 in the DCTF preseason poll. Shark hurler Reis Bowers signed to continue his career on the diamond at Blue Mountain

Community College in Pendleton, Oregon. PISD announced Dr. Jared Duncum as the lone finalist for the Superintendent vacancy. For the second time in less than 11 months, Palacios City Manager Cindy Raleigh took a 'leave of absence' from her post. The Matagorda Co. Seawall Commission welcomed newest Commissioner Erwin Janszen aboard. Part of the City of Palacios' \$5-million citywide drainage project made its way up 4th St. from South Bay. Palacios Aquatic Club swimming siblings Evelyn and William Garcia qualified for the State Swim Meet. Co. jobless rate went up in Nov.

Matagorda County's latest unemployment figures, according to the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC), increased ever so slightly from 5.0% in October to 5.3% during the month of November. Specifically of Matagorda County's labor force of 17,634 individuals, a total of 932 are looking for employment opportunities.
