

# **Council receives draft audit, awaiting final**

A draft is just a draft - not the final product. So agreed the Palacios City Council when it was presented with its preliminary draft budget at last week's regular meeting.

Melissa Terry of Harrison, Waldrop, & Uherek, LLP, the accounting firm hired to audit the Citys' budget for Fiscal Year 2023-2024, gave a presentation of the preliminary draft audit.

Questioned by Mayor Rick Cink on what the City's finances indicated, Terry noted the City's position is 'improving'.

"You have a lot of projects going on. It's just the management of these projects," Terry said. "There is a decrease in fund balance, but it doesn't mean the City is declining in any way. There are a lot of things that play a part in those. I can't say that's a good thing, but you all do have vision and you are working on projects that cost money. You do have people in place; they're being trained and are improving the system."

Mayor Cink asked how much of an impact Hurricane Beryl posed on the City's financial position.

"Besides having incurred those costs and not having an answer of when those (grant) projects are going to get approved and how much are going to get paid for those projects," Terry reported, "It affects the bottom line." She went on to try and explain the process with FEMA project approval and reimbursement level.

Councilman Chip Woolf questioned whether the audit found the City to be in compliance with its own policies.

"Are we okay without written policy we adopt each year about the amount of cash reserves we are supposed to have? Are we in compliance or are we in 'get better' mode?" Woolf howled.

Terry acknowledge the City's cash reserves are low. "There needs to be an increase in cash," she noted.

Councilwoman Donna Schulman directed eyes to Page 93 of the audit, where it discussed the prior year's findings, conditions and recommendations, and the current status.

"It's important to mention that I think the

staff has done a good job with current status as is from last year," she said. However, she noted "There were some issues."

Terry reassured Schulman the City was "on the right track."

"It takes some educating and some training, and some willingness to learn and time," Terry said.


Councilman Woolf declared his overall take on the audit was "We really need to concentrate on getting our utility fund to work. That is way the major thing, and it shows badly."

Months following the resignation and rehire on a month-to-month contract basis of former Port Director Victor Martinez, the Matagorda Co. Navigation District #1 (MCND) commissioners officially began their quest to find a fulltime replacement at last week's regular monthly meeting.

After discussions behind executive sessions closed doors, the commissioners returned to open session with action to begin the search for qualified candidates.

The Port Director job duties include the management, operation and devel-

opment of MCND#1 properties, including the Port of Palacios, and administrative/financial management, all in accordance with the policy direction of the MCND#1 Board of Commissioners.

Qualifications for the position include an appropriate four-year college degree, or comparable experience, and a minimum of five years of management experience with increasing responsibilities.

The desired candidate is a seasoned team leader with management experience in maritime, transportation, property development/leasing or other related operations. Work experience in a governmental entity is preferable. The salary for this position will be based on the candidate's experience, skills and

qualifications. A vehicle allowance and a Matagorda County Benefit package
