Unanswered requests, park upkeep & splash pad

A Councilwoman airs her unanswered information request, the revived Palacios Beautification Committee steps in to save the City's landscaping from disaster and a crash course on City Gov. 101 were packed into last week's near two-hour long Palacios City Council

Council's freshest face, Pos. 4's Victoria Duran wasted no time in letting her displeasure be known after having her request to City staff for information, fall on deaf ears.

"It's kind of shameful that I didn't get an answer," Duran declared.

She detailed her request for information from April sent via email to City Secretary

"If I need to send an email to certain people," Duran said of her info request, "The only reason I sent it to (City Secretary) Aleigha, is because she had sent the packet out."

Duran also requested the City's financial statements be written in a more simple way.

'It looks like you're giving Joe Blow \$500 but it doesn't tell me what it's going to and where it's coming from," she noted. "I'd like to see (the City credit card) broken down. Who's card is it coming out of? What are we paving? It just has Mastercard - but doesn't have it broken down which Mastercard.'

"If we're going to be distributing something in the paper, we need to have it broken down, Duran said.

Councilman Larry Glenn agreed with Du-

ran's sentiment for more details.

'There just needs to be more information given to us. Why we're paying it out and what 's going to," he said.

"We need more transparency for us, to answer people asking us questions.

Beautification Committee picks up landscape tab

Annette Singer of the Palacios Beautification Committee addressed Council during the Citizens Forum over the recent transition from lawn care professionals to City crews at the City's landscaped features.

"The landscape projects at the entrances to the City and at City Park, they really need professional maintenance," Singer stated. "They're very expensive projects, over \$100,000 each when they were put in.

"The Beautification Committee stepped in when we realized (the City) couldn't do it and realized (the City) had real money issues and if not (the City) wouldn't have dropped it," Singer continued. "We've gotten the funds to maintain it for six months with a professional which will get you through the next budget period. We'll cover maintenance, replacing plants that need to be replaced in all three locations." We hope that gives you enough time to take care of them.

Fellow member of the Beautification Committee, D.C. Dunham noted the situation at the City landscaped entrances and City Park and the efforts to maintain them has taken prec-

La Pachanga Cook-Off, Dance at El Maton Hall this weekend



City coffers boosted by 15% increase in sales tax

The City of Palacios' sales tax payment from the state comptroller's office totaled \$116,076 which is 15.4% more this month than the same time last year having received \$100,580. April's sales tax revenue is based on sales made in March and reported to the state in April. Year to date is also 19.32% more than 2024 with Palacios' total rising to \$460,193. The State of Texas sales tax revenue totaled \$4.24 billion in April, 7.1% more than last 'State sales tax collections

were likely driven in part by businesses in the manufacturing sector ordering materials to get inventory delivered before the tariffs announced in February and March took effect," Hegar said. "Collections from all sectors grew robustly compared with April 2024, coming in well above the rate of general price inflation. This is a dramatic contrast to March 2025 collections, which were down year-over-
